If you have been painting and have some supplies, just bring what you have to the first class and we'll go from there.

- Brushes Try two or three total. For large paintings use the #8-#10. Smaller brushes will be better on 9x12 canvas
 - O Bristle best for landscapes (stiffer)
 - O Sable or Synthetic best for blending (soft)
 - Size small #3 or #4; medium #5-#7; Large #8-#10
 - Filbert long hair, tapered end (blending and good overall brush)
 - Flat long hair, straight across top (leaves more brush strokes)
 - Bright short hair, straight across top (leaves more brush strokes)
 - Round #0 Sable Round to sign paintings
- Canvasses 11x14 is a good size to start with better to do several smaller to learn more
 - Canvas Board Inexpensive and great for beginners or exercises
 - Stretched More expensive, but better for more advanced students
 - Masonite Inexpensive, but must be prepared with Gesso
- Palette Largest you can afford
 - Disposable Somewhat expensive, but convenient; can buy plastic container and put in freezer
 - O Butcher's Tray White porcelain- You may have to clean after each use
 - Wood Have to clean and the wood color can be distracting (have to treat before first use)
 - Clear Acrylic needs cardboard or painted bottom; have to clean but a good alternative
- Paper Towels and/or Rags
- Mineral Spirits or Deodorized Paint Thinner less expensive at hardware stores; turpentine not allowed
- Small tin can to clean brushes (tuna fish can works great)
- Jar with lid to take used spirits home
- Paint bring anything that you have (my palette emphasizes warm and cool primary colors)
 - Titanium White or Permalba White
 - Lemon Yellow (cool) looks a little greenish
 - Cadmium Yellow (warm) looks like it has a touch of orange
 - Cadmium Red (warm) fire engine read, bright but not a dark red
 - Alizarin Crimson (cool) more of a bluish red
 - O Ultra Marine Blue (warm) more of a reddish blue sometimes French Ultra Marine Blue
 - o Thalo Blue (cool) robin's egg
- Paint (optional)
 - Burnt Umber good overall brown
 - Yellow Ochre good earth color and flesh tones
 - Thalo Green very strong but great if used correctly
 - o Red Rose or Thalo Red when mixed with white will keep a strong pink
 - Ivory Black don't need much but it works well to make green or backgrounds
- Photos
 - I have some you can use, but it's best if you start taking your own
- General Information
 - This is a beginning through advanced class. Try not to be intimidated, work at your own pace
 - I can set up a still-life study from objects at the league
 - You will have to take home your work at the end of each class (a large pizza or shirt box usually works well)
 - Bring plastic bags to take home anything that has paint or mineral spirits
 - The league will provide stand up easels
 - Wear old clothes
 - The class is low key so come prepared to learn and have fun
