"Prairie Meadow" Pastel Beautiful piece! Nice handling of edges (lost and found) and composition. Your color values are spot on and play nicely against each other creating a great pastel.

Best Theme - Susan McLean

"Natural Beauty" Photography Great photo. The composition is spot on. The focal point and layers make this a very interesting photo. The vibrant and contrasting colors are very nice, especially the bits of red.

Blooming with Life - Marge Hall

At the DuPage Art League on a Tuesday afternoon, you may hear a lot of laughter coming from Marge Hall's oil painting class. That's because she approaches teaching in the same way she approaches life ~ with a positive attitude and an infectious sense of humor.

"My dad was very creative," Marge said. "He was a prankster and music teacher. My mom was stricter, but also the life of the party. We always had laughter and positive thinking in the family, which was instilled in my soul."

Marge's teaching style combines her extensive knowledge of color and composition with animated facial expressions and funny noises, which her students intuitively understand. "I'm not into all the technical terms," she said. "You can get across a lot with humor."

Since her students are at different levels, Marge starts by asking them what they're interested in. She encourages them to bring in their own photos. The learning evolves as their painting progresses. "I'm more of a coach," she said. "I try to inspire and encourage more than offer a set of instructions."

Marge's students appreciate her teaching style. Marybeth Devine commented, "Marge is an excellent teacher, focusing on the skills each student needs to make their painting better. Beginners to seasoned artists appreciate her ability to know exactly what each painting needs. Her directions are very clear and she encourages the best in all of us. Most



of all she has a fun class with lots of joy and laughter."

Inspiration is abundant in her own artwork. Marge is enowned for her flower paintings, some of which are three feet wide. She creates a realistic

effect by carefully layering the oil paint and building up the color and values. It can take from thirty to sixty hours to create a painting in this manner, with four or five drying at different stages. Marge estimates that she has created over

370 flower paintings. "If you can't see the beauty in God's creation, I don't know what you're looking at, because in nature there's so much beauty," she said. "I just marvel at

it all. I never get tired of painting flowers. I can't wait to do the next one."

Her greatest reward is witnessing the impact that her paintings have on other people. "When I see how it affects them, I get paid in my heart," she said.

Marge uses a limited palette of six colors, a



warm and cool of each primary color plus white. She will sometimes include black, phthalo green, permanent rose or purple depending on what she's painting.

Her own involvement with painting started in eighth grade with an inspiring mentor. She got a degree in commercial art and then worked at a package design company. But her passion was painting, so she started taking abstract painting classes at the DuPage Art League with Don Digman and Eleanor Himmelfarb. While her paintings got awards, she still preferred realistic painting. She learned a great deal about color theory from Chung Lee, who was an impressionistic colorist. He had her look at a photograph of a barn and asked her to paint cold light and warm shadows. "It made me flop over my brain to think of those colors that I wasn't seeing on the photograph and that I was nterpreting with color theory," she said.

Marge's creativity doesn't stop with painting. She plays handbells and marimba at her church and is in the praise band and choir. She also plays piano and percussion instruments. She once directed an entire choral concert when the director had a family emergency. "I have more guts than brains," she remarked. "I got a driver';s license after going out to drive only two times."

Marge and her husband Joe were married for 55 years before he succumbed to cancer a few years ago. They raised four sons and have ten grandchildren. She says they were strict, but always had fun. "Your goal as a parent is to make your children independent and self-sufficient," she said. "They are all successful and two of them are self-employed, so I think we've taught them that if you want to do something, then go do it."

Blaaming with Life, Marge Hall, continued

Marge is an honorary life member of the DuPage Art League and has served as president and in various other roles. She has been teaching at the league since 1975. Her husband was a computer geek and helped to get the league computers going. What she likes most about being a member is the camaraderie with other artists.

"Art can be simple and fun, or it can be tedious and frustrating," she said. "It's how you approach it." Her students appreciate that perspective. Elizabeth O'Flynn remarked, "I love Marge for her optimism and her sense of joy. She's full of life and positive vibes."



Her advice for people looking to improve their art is to draw something every day. If you keep drawing, you get your eye to hone in on what you see, not how you think it should look. "Learning how to see is the trick." She also uses a card with a hole punched in it to help students isolate the color of a subject and discern how dark or light it is.

Marge recently celebrated her eightieth birthday with her daughter-in-law Cari, who has the same birthdate. She claims they only had one margarita. When people comment on how much energy she has, she simply says, "I think I have a love of life."
