#### **Board Meeting Notes - March**

Jennifer Bayer reports we are doing well.

Resources: Unrestricted cash increased by less than 1% from the previous month.

Financial Activity: Total income for the period was more than budget by due to higher than budget in membership, gallery sales, summer classes, open studio, donations and interest from government securities. This difference is net of lower than budget artists' sales, class revenue for fall sessions A and B, winter session B and workshop revenue. Total expenses for the period less than budget due to lower than budget in artists' payments, workshop instructors, and supplies. This difference is net of higher than budget repair and maintenance expense.

Reserves: Based on the annual budgeted expenses, DPAL has 18 months of reserves (no change from January 2025) based on its unrestricted cash.

Membership: Amy Tran Reports we currently have 390 members.

**Exhibits: Danielle Crilly** reported: our member show theme for March was "Women's History Month" to coincide with the Downtown Wheaton Association's "We are Women" Art Walk. Our member participation is continuing to be impressive, with almost 90 entries again this month. Mary Dorrell had her wonderful show in Gallery II.

Community Outreach: Carol Kincaid reported that the Art League had 3 requests for donations of our donated artwork: The DuPage County Historical Foundation Museum, We Grow Dreams, and the Wheaton Junior Women's Club In addition I conducted a tour of the league for the Glenbard Transitional Program. About 20 young adults and their helpers, toured the gallery and saw several of our artists at work in February. I also held a 1 hour hands-on- art program for AID on March 6 th .AID is a program for special needs adults whom live in group homes in Aurora.

#### The DPAL Used Art Book Sales 2025

As you walk into our gallery space, you'll notice a shelf with donated art books for sale to members and gallery visitors. Those books represent a modest opportunity to support the DPAL to the tune of several hundred dollars a year. They come from your home as you sort, redecorate and simplify your life. # Gallery II April Solo Exhibit "Quite Contrary" A show of the artworks of Mary Kate Fahrenbach Venturini

Mary Kate's work explores the push and pull between two opposing forces - chaos and control-through painting. She is especially interested in humanity's infatuation with plants and our many attempts to control what we, by definition cannot: wilderness.

#### In her words:

"I long for wilderness. And in the frozen dark of winter, houseplants and conservatories are the closest I can get. But sticking nature in a pot feels like subjugation rather than wilderness. What does it mean to cultivate the wild? How do these acts of nurturing and control impact us? How does it impact the plants, both individually and globally?"

Mary Kate Fahrenbach Venturini is a visual artist based in Wheaton, IL. She received a bachelor's degree in The Program of Liberal Studies and Graphic Design from the University of Notre Dame and has taken continuing education courses in visual art at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, and drawing and painting at the DuPage Art League.

She has worked in graphic design and communications before shifting to focus on visual art. Mary Kate's immersion in the day-to-day experience of parenting twins provides the best and constant examples of clash between chaos and control.





She attended the South Porch Artists Residency in South Carolina in the fall of 2024. Her work is also on display from March 8 - April 26, 2025 at "No Ordinary Light", a group show at DANK Haus in Chicago.

Sadly, we recently learned that Judith Deshone Hall passed away on February 12, 2025, In Corpus Christi.



#### Art Material Safety – Part Two

#### Toxic Ingredients in art supplies including paint

Art supplies, including paints, often contain chemicals that can be toxic if used improperly or in excessive amounts. Take a few seconds to become aware of these chemicals and their potential health risks.





Heavy Metals. Lead is better regulated than it used to be, but cadmium is still widely used in art supplies and paints, especially in super bright colors like yellow, red, and orange. Cadmium is a natural element found in tiny amounts in air, water, soil, and food. Avoid inhaling dust and skin exposure.

VOCs. Volatile Organic Compounds (aka VOCs) include a huge variety of chemicals, and they can cause a variety of health issues, from eye, nose, and throat irritation to nervous system damage. Certain types of paint may contain acetone, xylene, ethyl acetate, ethylene glycol, formaldehyde or formaldehyde-releasers, benzene, among other VOCs.


